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INTRODUCTION

What is Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools®?

Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools® (UCS) is a program for schools Pre-K through university that intentionally promotes social inclusion by bringing together students with and without intellectual disabilities (ID) through sport and education-related activities. The three-component model offers a unique combination of effective activities that equip young people with the knowledge, skills, tools, and training to create classrooms and school climates of acceptance, respect, and meaningful inclusion.

The strategy is woven into the fabric of the school community, enhancing existing efforts and providing rich opportunities that empower all students to be the agents of genuine change in their schools, creating socially inclusive environments that support and engage all learners.

What is Meaningful Inclusion?

The concept of meaningful inclusion promotes understanding of each student's individual value, and the mutual benefits that come from each person's contribution to the relationship. It reflects significant inclusion, not just a gratuitous acknowledgement.


Meaningful inclusion further emphasizes that people with intellectual disabilities should not be treated as individuals who need help and pity, but rather have as much to offer as anyone.

What does meaningful inclusion look like in a school?

Making sports teams and clubs inclusive for all students with and without intellectual disabilities. These are called Unified Sports or Unified Clubs!

What does meaningful inclusion look like in a community?

Participating in a polar plunge or volunteering at Special Olympics state events!



WHY INCLUSION TILES?

The purpose of Inclusion Tiles is to help gear your mind to think of the true meaning of Unified Sports and activities. Meaningful inclusion can be a hard thing to put into words, and the Inclusion Tiles are a way to begin this conversation. Each student will have different ideas about what each tile means. This is because people have their own personal and unique experiences from Special Olympics Unified Sports®, school, and the community. The Inclusion Tiles do not have a specific order that they should be placed in. They represent an individual's experience.

The Inclusion Tiles are designed to be used between students, adults, and people of all ages. This activity can be done many different times, but the discussion can vary each time if individuals bring up different or new experiences. The keywords or concepts on the back of each tile help to guide conversation, but meaning can vary from person to person. The explanations and examples are centered around the inclusion of people with intellectual disabilities, but Inclusion Tiles can be used to discuss meaningful inclusion in all forms.

SOCIAL MEDIA GUIDANCE

INCLUSION TILES ACTIVITY

This is an example of an activity you and your Unified partner can lead in your classroom, Unified Club or Youth Activation Committee. Follow the script below for guidance!



TIP:

Be confident in what you are going to bring as the leader of this activity! Work with your Unified partner to identify each other's strengths!

EXPLAIN INCLUSION TILES AND ACTIVITY

Estimated Time: 2 minutes

Speaker One: In front of you, you'll see 9 tiles that all have different words or phrases on

them. You will notice that some are more positive and some might be more negative. Take a minute to look through the tiles and get familiar with the

words on the front and the definition or examples on the back.

[Speakers, give students a few minutes to look them over.]

ORDER THE INCLUSION TILES INDIVIDUALLY

Estimated Time: 8 – 10 minutes

Speaker One: In this activity, you and your partner start with placing the Inclusion Tiles

in an order that makes sense to you. Now either take a picture of your order or write it down so that way your partner can start working on their order. By the end of this section, each person should have a starting lineup either

written down or on their phone.

GROUP SHARING

Estimated Time: 2 minutes

Speaker Two: Now that you have your individual order, would anyone like to share out

how they placed their cards?

[Pick on someone from the larger group to share their order.]

INCLUSION TILES ACTIVITY (CONTINUED)

CREATE AN ORDER WITH PARTNER

Estimated Time: 5 minutes

Speaker One: Now that you have a combined starting lineup, let's think about what

meaningful inclusion means to you.

Speaker Two: Meaningful inclusion further shows that people with intellectual disabilities

should not be treated as individuals that need help and pity, but rather have

as much to offer as anyone.

Speaker One: That is a great definition!

Speaker Two: Now, take a minute on your sheet and write down what meaningful inclusion

means to you.

GROUP DISCUSSION WITH 4 PEOPLE/TABLE

Estimated Time: 5 minutes

Speaker Two: Now match up with another Unified pair and share with each other what your

definition of meaningful inclusion is and about the orders of your Inclusion Tiles.

Speaker One: Let's share out! How were your orders different than those you spoke with and

how did this tie into what you think about meaningful inclusion?

[Ask 3 different pairs to share. This can also lead to a bigger discussion.]

CLOSING

Estimated Time: 5 minutes

Speaker One: To wrap up the activity, take a few minutes to fill out <u>this survey</u> about what

you learned from the tiles or any takeaways you have after doing this activity.



TIP

This is a great opportunity to ask if any of your peers would want to lead this activity in the future!

In each deck of Inclusion Tiles, there are 4 activity cards. Unified pairs can lead these activities as well!
